Work permits are issued through this office. Any student under the age of 18 is required to have a work permit on file.


Community College Partnerships

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM

Advanced Placement (AP) is a program created by the College Board which offers college-level curricula and examinations to high school students. When students take AP courses and exams, they demonstrate to college admission officers that they have sought out an educational experience that will prepare them for success in college and beyond.

Performing well on an AP Exam means more than just the successful completion of a course. Most colleges and universities accept successful exam scores for credit, advanced placement, or both. Research consistently shows that students who are successful in AP typically experience greater academic success in college than those who do not participate in AP.

AP Exam scores are a weighted combination of scores on a multiple-choice section and a free-response section. AP Exam scores are reported on a 5-point scale that indicates how qualified the student is to receive college credit and placement for their performance:

5 = extremely well qualified

4 = well qualified

3 = qualified

2 = possibly qualified

1 = no recommendation

AP Exam scores of 5 are equivalent to grades of A+ and A in the corresponding college course. AP Exam scores of 4 are equivalent to grades of A-, B+ and B in college. AP Exam scores of 3 are equivalent to grades of B-, C+ and C in college.

How to join CSF?

CSF membership must be earned one semester at a time. The CSF sign up periods are August (for fall semester) and January (for spring semester).

How to become a Sealbearer?

Students must be a CSF member for four (4) semesters, including at least one (1) semester as a senior. The four semesters need not be consecutive, but must be based on grades earned in Grades 10, 11, and 12. The two "Associate" semesters based on grade 9 grades DO NOT COUNT TOWARD SEALBEARER status.

Fall semester seniors with at least three (3) semesters of membership are considered "Prospective" sealbearers. Those who qualify for a fourth semester during Spring Enrollment are recognized as SEALBEARERS. However, any senior who could qualify for a fourth semester by the end of the year (May) is still considered a "Prospective." A final Sealbearer Verification Check is circulated to his/her teachers in mid-May, about two weeks before graduation. If a prospective then qualifies, they will be recognized as a Sealbearer during the DHS commencement ceremony.

SPECIAL GRADUATION HONORS FOR SEALBEARERS: All sealbearers wear gold cords and tassels and lead the class onto the field for commencement, and are cited as "graduating with honors" when their names are read. A gold CSF seal is embossed on the diploma as permanent evidence of academic excellence.

CSF is a statewide organization that recognizes and honors students for outstanding scholarship in academic coursework. Downey High is proud to have been an active CSF chapter since 1938. Nationally, colleges and universities have come to recognize CSF membership as an indication of an applicant's excellent scholarship. Each year, about 5% of California's graduating seniors are honored as CSF Sealbearers; this is also the highest academic honor awarded at DHS. Earning CSF eligibility is determined by CSF "academic points;" grades of 'A' or 'B' are the only grades that earn CSF points, even in AP/Honors classes.

CSF academic points are earned as follows:

- A semester grade of 'A' = three (3) CSF points
- A semester grade of 'B' = one (1) CSF point

With these exceptions:

- A semester grade of 'A' or 'B' in an Honors/AP class = 1
 additional CSF point, up to a maximum of two such points
 each semester.
- A grade of 'C' earns no CSF points, regardless of course title.
- A grade of 'D' or 'F' in any subject automatically disqualifies membership (even if it is in a class not being used for CSF).
- A 4 or 5 in citizenship in any class automatically disqualifies membership.
- No CSF points are given for PE, for any class repeated to improve a grade, or for courses such as Office Service/Teaching Aide or Lab Assistant.
- Summer school classes do not count towards CSF membership.
- College classes count the same as high school classes (no inflated grade points).

Once ten (10) CSF points have been identified, the following very specific criteria must also be considered:

- Of the minimum ten (10) points, the first FOUR (4) points must come from grades earned in classes on List I.
- Of the minimum ten (10) points, the cumulative first seven (7) points must come from List I and List II. List III courses do not count in the first seven points.
- The remaining three (3) points may come from any list. Note: All ten (10) points may come from List I courses.
- Grades from only five (5) classes may be used to qualify.

MUSIC PROGRAM





The Music program at Downey High School consists of eleven different classes. Marching Band, Color Guard, Wind Ensemble, Advanced Band, Band 1/2, Percussion Ensemble, Jazz Band (1), Jazz Band (2), Jazz Choir, Men's Chorus, and Women's Chorus. Individuals must audition to be a part of any performing group. Most auditions take place prior to the beginning of the school year.

Marching Band and Color Guard

The Downey High School Marching Band and Color guard is one of the largest organizations on campus. This ensemble performs at pep rallies, football games, basketball games, and volleyball games on campus, and performs at various events around the Downey community. During the fall they compete in numerous field show competitions and parades. Students enrolled in Marching Band/Color guard during the fall semester receive PE credit because of the physical demands of the course.

The Beginning/Intermediate Choir

The beginning choir class offers basic instruction on signing and reading music. The students develop techniques in order to learn how to sing properly. They must also prepare for performances. They perform at least once per semester either at a music program's concerts, or at a district festival.

Jazz Band and Jazz Choir

The Jazz groups have a special focus, in addition to the music aspects learned in the concert band. There is an increase in creativity, both as individuals and in small groups. This aspect is exhibited through the improvisational skills taught in these classes, where students enjoy the liberty to express themselves in their own individual way. The Jazz groups perform in the community and elsewhere, in addition to the competitions, festivals, and regular music program concerts. They go annually to the Reno and Folsom Jazz Festivals, and the top groups performed at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, and the Apollo Theater in New York, Hollywood Bowl, and at the Disney Concert Hall. Both Jazz Choir and Jazz Band are finalists at the Next Generation Jazz Festival in Monterey. The Jazz Choir is the winner of the Reno Jazz Festival in 2018, while the top Jazz Band is the winner of the Monterey and Boston competitions in 2019, along with the Downbeat national magazine best jazz ensemble category in both 2018 and 2019. All groups have won many awards in the 20 years of Mr. Olariu's tenure here at Downey High.

Students who participate in MADE career pathways have the opportunity to enroll in classes that will teach them valuable job skills in a wide variety of industry sectors. When they learn about a topic, they are not just learning the basic skills needed for creating a product; they get to experience the entire process and learn about every aspect of what goes into the business of that product. Even if they start with no knowledge or experience, MADE students will be prepared to step directly out of the classroom and into internships and jobs with a deep understanding of their profession and how to advance and be successful in it. Every pathway has courses available for students of every grade level, and many include capstone projects for juniors or seniors to showcase their growth over the course of their education.

AUTOMOTIVE



AUTOMOTIVE TECHNOLOGY

Auto Technology prepares students to work with and around vehicles, in order to prepare them for work in the Automotive Industry or as a life skill. Students will identify basic automotive systems, components, and tools. Shop equipment use, safety, and shop operations will be taught as well. The focus of the class will be on general vehicle information, automotive engines and preventive maintenance, but will also introduce the drivetrain, suspension, steering, brakes, and simple electrical systems as well. Safety leads the processes our shop, with professional conduct being enforced to develop students in effective workers in the future.



AUTOMOTIVE ENGINEERING

Automotive Engineering follows the Automotive Technology class, and relies on it as a foundation. This class adds Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning as well as more advanced electrical systems theory. The work in this class build on previous information for use in more project based efforts, which leads toward solving diagnostic problems in vehicles. An understanding of automotive structure and function will be delivered to show how basic automotive knowledge may be used in many different ways. Professionalism projects will be fielded to help students understand career choices and goals, and the "soft skills" that help them find work and pursue goals.



CLASSES OFFERED:

<u>Dance 1:</u> This course is a beginning level class for students who have little to no formal dance training. In this class students will be building a foundation of dance technique in the areas of Ballet, Jazz, Modern, and Hip-Hop. No evaluation or audition is required to be enrolled in this course of study.

<u>Dance 2:</u> Students who are enrolled in this class need to be at a proficient level with at least one or more years of formal dance training. Enrollment in this course requires a teacher evaluation for proper placement and serves as the bridge between Dance 1 and Dance Ensemble.

<u>Dance Ensemble:</u> This course targets the highly motivated and skilled dance student who wants to be apart of our competitive dance team. 

DIGITAL IMAGING

"Digital Imaging is an introductory course that teaches students a broad set of skills in Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator while maintaining a fine arts approach and focus. This class is similar to a traditional art class, except the tools are different. Instead of canvas and paint, we use computers, software programs and printers.

In Digital Imaging, students will use state-of-the-art digital imaging software and concepts to create projects which integrate art, graphic design, photo manipulation and illustration. In addition, students will learn the importance and application of creative expression and design techniques."

ENGINEERING

IED -Introduction to Design

In this course, students use 3D solid modeling design software to help them design solutions to solve proposed problems. Students will learn how to document their work and communicate solutions to peers and members of the professional community. This course is designed for 9th or 10th grade students. The major focus of the ID course is to expose students to the design process, research and analysis, teamwork, communication methods, global and human impacts, engineering standards and technical documentation.

POE-Principles of Engineering

This survey course of engineering exposes students to some of the major concepts they'll encounter in a post secondary engineering course of study. Students have an opportunity to investigate engineering and high-tech careers and to develop skills and understanding of course concepts. Students employ engineering and scientific concepts in the solution of engineering design problems. They develop problem solving skills and apply their knowledge of research and design to create solutions to various challenges. Students also learn how to document their work and communicate their solutions to peers and members of the professional community.

ERD -Engineering Research & Design

Tier 2 - Specialization Courses

The major focus of this course is to expose students to the world of aeronautics, flight and engineering through the fields of aeronautics, aerospace engineering and related areas of study. Lessons engage students in engineering design problems related to aerospace information systems, astronautics, rocketry, propulsion, the physics of space science, space life sciences, the biology of space science, principles of aeronautics, structures and materials, and systems engineering. Students work in teams utilizing hands-on activities, projects and problems and are exposed to various situations faced by aerospace engineers. In addition, students use 3D design software to help design solutions to proposed problems. Students design intelligent vehicles to learn about documenting their project, solving problems and communicating their solutions to their peers and members of the professional community. This course is designed for 11th or 12th grade students.

AE -Aerospace Engineering

Tier 3 - Capstone Course

This capstone course allows students to design a solution to a technical problem of their choosing. They have the chance to eliminate one of the "Don't you hate it when ... " statements of the world. This is an engineering research course in which students will work in teams to research, design, test and construct a solution to an openended engineering problem. The product development life cycle and a design process are used to guide and help the team to reach a solution to the problem. The team presents and defends their solution to a panel of outside reviewers at the conclusion of the course. The ERD course allows students to apply all the skills and knowledge learned in previous Project Lead The Way courses. The use of 3D design software helps students design solutions to the problem their team has chosen. This course also engages students in time management and teamwork skills, a valuable set for students in the future. This course is designed for 12th grade students.

FINANCIAL SERVICES



This course is designed for students who desire to complete a course of study in financial services to gain skills and knowledge and obtain entry-level finance positions in small and medium size businesses. Students will be prepared to be successful in the dynamic, creative, and fast paced field of marketing. Students will develop their critical thinking skills while making decisions on values, wants and needs. Students will review, money management systems such as banking and reconciliation. Students will have the opportunity to experience and plan spending, buying decisions, and the management of credit. Students will have the opportunity to utilize a hands-on approach to analyze of personal decisions.



FOOD SCIENCE



Food Science, Dietetics & Nutrition

The Food Science, Dietetics, and Nutrition courses prepare students for employment in occupations in the related industries. These occupations include food scientists, dieticians, nutritionists and entrepreneurs in the meal planning/food prep business. In this class, students will receive instruction about foods and food groups, nutrition and activity needs through the life cycle, current nutrition and food guidelines, and will develop a strong understanding of the role diet, nutrients, and exercise play in the overall health of all individuals. Students will also learn the science behind foods and food prep and perform weekly hands-on applications by preparing various recipes in our classroom cooking lab.



FOUNDATIONS OF LAW

Foundations of Law

Foundations in Law is an introductory course for students curious about career options in the various fields of law. The class is designed to help students understand why we live under the rule of law, and how laws are created, enforced, interpreted, and changed. Foundations in Law enables students to examine diverse areas of law including criminal, civil, constitutional, and international. It also explores civil rights issues and the role of advocacy, civics, and the media in our legal system. As part of the course curriculum, students will participate in class discussions, complete individual and group projects, prepare and complete a mock criminal investigation, as well as research careers related to the study of law.


GRAPHIC DESIGN

In Graphic Design class, high school students learn the principles of great design and typography from a design industry professional while using professional-grade Adobe design software to create digital drawings, logos, advertisements, magazine layouts, and more. Students learn how to maintain websites, edit and process photos and images, craft multi-dimensional images, use popular software, develop designs and draw. They also learn about electronic production, animation, color theory, video, file management, layout and programming.





MULTIMEDIA VIDEO PRODUCTION







Multimedia Video Production is a hands-on, project-based course where students learn how to plan, shoot, and edit a visual story using professional video editing software such as Final Cut Pro and Premiere Pro. Students will explore topics such as non-linear editing, aesthetic aspects of camera work, the production process, and digital video camera use while working on various projects both individually and as part of a group. In the second year Capstone course students will dive deeper into topics such as scriptwriting, cinematography, producing, and directing.





SPORTS MEDICINE



Students will learn skills as they relate to the field of sports medicine, with an emphasis in prevention, care, and rehabilitation of athletic injuries. Students will be exposed to the historical and organizational perspective or sports medicine, detailed anatomical and biomechanical study of each major body region, physiological response of tissue, specific medical conditions and injuries, scientific principals of injury prevention, assessment, rehabilitation, exercise physiology and human performance. Students will obtain background knowledge in basic anatomy and physiology, medical terminology, ethical and legal issues as they relate to the field of sports medicine, and sport psychological theories. Students will receive training and optional certification in First Aid and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) as well as use of Automated External Defibrillators (AED). In addition, students will gain knowledge about different medical careers as they pertain to the field of Kinesiology.


