- Encourages students to identify a problem or issue, then plan, take action, and reflect on their learning and impact. Students work in groups of two or three students.



SUPERVISOR VS MENTOR

RESPONSIBILITIES

Supervisor (IB MYP Teachers)

- Oversees the project to ensureIB requirements are met. Reviews documentation, ensures timelines and guidelines are followed.
- Meets at required checkpoints (3 times minimum)
- Responsible for assessing the project using the IB rubric.
- Must be trained in IB MYP assessment practices.
- Reviews entries to ensure they show progress and reflection.

Mentor

(VOLUNTARY-Anyone in the school or community)

- Passion Project!- Students will be looking for someone they can connect with
- Meant to be fun! Guides and supports the student group Provides feedback, encouragement, and helps brainstorm ideas
- Meets with the student informally. Can be anyone in the school or community with interest in supporting student growth.
- Open and responsive, builds a rapport.

Please note: The supervisor cannot be the mentor.


PROGESS JOURNAL

The process journal that studentswill complete throughout this process for the 2025-2026 school year will be on CANVAS as a course.

Completion of this process journal is a requirement of this project, and will be due in the Spring.

4 Modules (Not extensive): designed to guide the students along their journey.

The grade counts towards the IB MYP Certificate. It is not a part of any class grade. The assigned supervisors will check periodically to ensure that the assignments are being completed.



TYPES OF SERVICE LEARNING PROJECTS THAT OUR STUDENTS WILL COMPLETE

Direct Action

When you personally interact with people, the environment, or animals to meet a need

Research

When you investigate an issue to understand it better and share what you learn to help others

Indirect Action

When you help others without direct contact, often by organizing or creating

Advocacy

When you speak up or take action to promote a cause or bring attention to an issue



PROJECT EXAMPLES

- -Interviewingpeople with firsthand experience who were affected by an issue
- -Reviewing local policies or laws -Collecting stories or testimonials to highlight impact of an issue



PROJECT EXAMPLE

Advocacy Performing in a play that promotes anti-bullying

Other examples: -Designing and sharing posters or flyers with a call to action

-Using art (murals, poetry, film) to tell stories and make your advocacy message stick



WHAT YOU CAN DO TO SUPPORT YOUR CHILD AND THER TEAM

Be a Facilitator (Not Doer)

The project is student-led, so your role is to provide guidance, encouragement, and resources, while allowing your child to take ownership of the project.

Stay Connected

Stay informed about the project timeline, requirements, and assessment criteria by communicating with the school and your child's supervisor/advisor.




Expertise and Resources
