IPM statement

It is the goal of Downey Unified School District to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to: *(Example: Focus on long-term pest prevention)*

Implement procedures that meet the Healthy Schools Act of 2000
Use alternative methods in dealing with pest and weeds to minimize the amount of pesticides and herbicides used.

Specific information about monitoring and inspecting for pests, such as locations, times, or techniques include:

Communicate about inspections and their findings. Rodent traps are set and checked every other day by the Chemical Applications Specialist. Termites are monitored and are treated at isolated locations to minimize the amount of pesticide used.
