RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DOWNEY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, AND ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Downey Unified School District (the "District") is devoted to improving the quality of education in our local public schools by providing classrooms, facilities and upgraded technology to support high quality instruction in core subjects like math, science, engineering, technology and career technical education; and

WHEREAS, since many District schools were built approximately 70 years ago, additional resources are necessary to make basic improvements, including upgrading deteriorating roofs, plumbing, sewer lines, heating, ventilation, air conditioning and electrical systems; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that schools within the District need to be upgraded, repaired, expanded, improved, modernized and better equipped in a fiscally prudent manner to enable the District to meet current health, building and safety codes, earthquake safety standards and provide proper access for students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board believes that to be prepared for college, in-demand careers in fields like health sciences, engineering and technology, and skilled trades, students need modern labs and career technical education facilities and equipment; and

WHEREAS, the State of California (the "State") has been unable to provide the District with enough money for the District to adequately construct and repair schools to provide an optimal learning environment for all students and which keep pace with other top-performing districts; and

WHEREAS, the District has completed a facilities assessment with extensive community engagement to identify the most pressing needs in each of the District's schools to provide safe and modern classroom environments for all students; and

WHEREAS, even if you do not have school-age children, supporting a local bond measure is a wise investment, as good schools improve the quality of life in our community and protect the value of our homes; and

WHEREAS, the Board has received information regarding the possibility of a local bond measure and its bonding capacity; and

WHEREAS, a local measure will help provide funds, that are locally controlled and cannot be redirected by the State, to upgrade aging schools and protect student safety; and

WHEREAS, such measure will include mandatory taxpayer protections, including an independent citizens' oversight committee and mandatory audits to ensure funds are spent as authorized; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2000, the voters of California approved the Smaller Classes, Safer Schools and Financial Accountability Act ("Proposition 39") which reduced the voter threshold for ad valorem tax levies used to pay for debt service on bonded indebtedness to 55% of the votes cast on a school district general obligation bond; and

WHEREAS, concurrent with the passage of Proposition 39, Chapter 1.5, Part 10, Division 1, Title 1 (commencing with Section 15264) of the Education Code (the "Act") became operative and established requirements associated with the implementation of Proposition 39; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to make certain findings herein to be applicable to this election order and to establish certain performance audits, standards of financial accountability and citizen oversight that are contained in Proposition 39 and the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Board and District have solicited stakeholder and community input on school priorities from parents, teachers, staff, the community and civic leaders; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the submission of a proposition to the District's voters at an election to authorize the issuance of bonds to pay for certain necessary improvements and enhancements to District educational facilities which will improve the safety, health, and quality of education for students in the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby determines that, in accordance with Opinion No. 04-110 of the Attorney General of the State of California, the restrictions in Proposition 39 which prohibit any bond money from being wasted or used for inappropriate administrative salaries or other operating expenses of the District shall be strictly enforced by the District's Citizens' Oversight Committee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code Section 15270, based upon a projection of assessed property valuation, the Board has determined that, if approved by voters, the tax rate levied to meet the debt service requirements of the bonds proposed to be issued will not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per year per \$100,000 of assessed valuation of taxable property; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code Section 9400 et seq. requires that a tax rate statement be contained in all official materials relating to the election, including any ballot pamphlet prepared, sponsored, or distributed by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to authorize the filing of a tax rate statement and a ballot argument in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters at the election; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Elections Code, it is appropriate for the Board to request consolidation of the election with any and all other elections to be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022, and to request the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters to perform certain election services for the District.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE DOWNEY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board, pursuant to Education Code Sections 15100 et seq., 15264 et seq., and Government Code Section 53506, hereby requests the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voter to conduct an election under the provisions of Proposition 39 and the Act and submit to the electors of the District the question of whether bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of \$504,000,000 (the "Bonds") shall be issued and sold for the purpose of raising money for the projects described in Exhibits "A" and "B" hereto. Both exhibits are directed to be printed in the voter pamphlet. The District's Superintendent, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, as may be convenient or

necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of election officials, and requirements of law.

- Section 2. That the date of the election shall be November 8, 2022.
- Section 3. That the purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a proposition, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked Exhibit "A," incorporated by reference herein, and containing the question of whether the District shall issue the Bonds to pay for improvements to the extent permitted by such proposition. In compliance with Proposition 39 policies of the Board and the Act, the ballot propositions in Exhibits "A" and "B" are subject to the following requirements and determinations:
- (a) that the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall be used only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and not for any other purpose, including teacher or administrator salaries or other school operating expenses;
- (b) that the Board, in establishing the projects set forth in Exhibit "B," evaluated the safety, class size reduction, classroom, educational and information technology needs of the District as well as the importance of the projects to improve student learning in core subjects like math, science, engineering, the arts and technology;
- (c) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent performance audit to be conducted to ensure that the Bond monies get spent only for the projects identified in Exhibit "B" hereto;
- (d) that the Board shall cause an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of Bonds to be conducted until all of the Bond proceeds have been expended;
- (e) that the Board shall appoint a Citizens' Oversight Committee in compliance with Education Code Section 15278 no later than 60 days after the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code Section 15274; and
- (f) that the tax levy authorized to secure the Bonds of this election shall not exceed the Proposition 39 limits per \$100,000 of taxable property in the District when assessed valuation is projected by the District to increase in accordance with Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.
- Section 4. That the authority for ordering the election is contained in Education Code Sections 15100 et seq., 15264 et seq., and Government Code Section 53506.
- Section 5. That the authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Education Code Section 5322. In connection with ordering the election pursuant to the provisions cited above, the District has obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made the Los Angeles County Assessor that are available to the District.
- Section 6. That each of the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors are hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on November 8, 2022 within the District. As provided in Elections Code Section 10403, the District acknowledges that the consolidation election will be conducted in the manner described in Elections Code Section 10418.

Section 7. That the Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to deliver a certified copy of this Resolution to the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters no later than August 12, 2022.

Section 8. That Bonds may be issued pursuant to Education Code Section 15264 et seq. or Government Code Section 53506. The maximum rate of interest on any Bond shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by Education Code Sections 15140 to 15143, as modified by Government Code Section 53531.

Section 9. That the Board requests the governing body of any such other political subdivision, or any officer otherwise authorized by law, to partially or completely consolidate such election and to further provide that the canvass of the returns of the election be made by any body or official authorized by law to canvass such returns, and that the Board consents to such consolidation. The Board further authorizes the submission of a tax rate statement and primary and rebuttal arguments, as appropriate, to be filed with the Los Angeles County Registrars of Voters by the established deadlines.

Section 10. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5303 and Elections Code Section 10002, the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County are requested to permit their Registrar of Voters to render all services specified by Elections Code Section 10418 relating to the election, for which services the District agrees to reimburse Los Angeles County, such services to include the publication of a Formal Notice of School Bond Election and the mailing of the sample ballot and tax rate statement (described in Elections Code Section 9401) pursuant to the terms of Education Code Section 5363 and Elections Code Section 12112.

FULL TEXT BALLOT PROPOSITION OF THE DOWNEY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND MEASURE ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 2022

The following is the full proposition presented to the voters by the Downey Unified School District.

"To repair and improve Downey's aging neighborhood schools, improve school safety/security systems, fix deteriorating roofs, plumbing, electrical, ventilation; repair, construct, acquire classrooms, labs, facilities/ equipment, support student achievement and college/career readiness in math, science, technology, engineering, arts/ skilled trades, shall Downey Unified School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$504,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying 5 cents per \$100 assessed value (\$20,000,000 annually) while bonds are outstanding, with independent citizen oversight and all money locally-controlled?

PROJECT LIST

The Board of Education of the Downey Unified School District is committed to improving the quality of education in our local public schools by providing safe, secure, modern classrooms, labs and technology needed to support high quality instruction in math, science, engineering, technology, the arts and skilled trades. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's urgent and critical facility needs, including safety issues, class size reduction, basic repairs, computer and information technology in developing the types of projects to be funded by this measure as described below.

In approving this Project List, the Board of Education determines that the District must:

- (i) Provide classrooms, facilities and technology needed to support high quality instruction in math, science, engineering, and technology; and
- (ii) Provide modern labs, career training facilities and equipment so students are prepared for college and in-demand careers in fields like health sciences, engineering, technology and skilled trades; and
- (iii) Install, repair, or replace air conditioning in classrooms to keep temperatures in comfortable ranges on hot days; and
- (iv) Remove asbestos, lead pipes and other hazardous materials from schools and ensure that all schools meet current earthquake safety standards; and
- (v) Enhance student safety at all school sites; and
- (vi) Provide a clear system of accountability and public disclosure:
 - (a) All expenditures subject to annual independent financial audits.

- (b) All funds stay local. The State cannot redirect or take away any monies.
- (c) All expenditures reviewed by an independent citizen oversight committee to ensure that funds are spent only as authorized.
- (d) Mandate public disclosure of all bond spending.

The Project List includes the following types of upgrades and improvements at District schools, facilities and sites:

REPAIR OLDER SCHOOLS AND IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION

School Repair and Upgrade Projects Funded By Money That Cannot Be Taken By The State

Goals and Purposes:

Downey elementary schools were built back when campus security was not a big concern. These bonds will make schools safer, including better security fencing, establishing a single point of entry, and installing digital locks to prevent intruders from accessing classrooms.

Nearly all of our schools were built more than 70 years ago and most elementary schools don't meet modern building codes or safety codes. Some contain hazardous materials including asbestos and lead pipes, while others may need to be retrofitted for earthquake safety.

- Install air conditioning in classrooms where needed to keep temperatures in comfortable ranges on hot days.
- Upgrade older schools so they meet current health codes, building safety codes, earthquake safety standards, and provide proper access for students with disabilities.
- Provide modern science labs and career technical facilities and equipment, so students are
 prepared for college and in-demand careers in fields like health sciences, engineering,
 technology, and skilled trades.
- Make repairs to older classrooms and school facilities including deteriorating roofs, plumbing, sewer, heating, ventilation, and electrical systems.
- Remove hazardous materials like asbestos and lead pipes from older school sites.
- Replace wood and support beams that have extensive termite damage and dry rot.
- Replace aging heating, ventilation systems and improve filtration to provide healthy, smokefree air in classrooms.
- Make energy efficiency improvements to heating, ventilation, insulation, doors, and windows
 to save on utility bills and have more money to spend in the classroom educating students.
- Provide modern science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) labs at elementary schools so that students are prepared for middle and high school.

 Improve student safety and campus security, including security fencing, security cameras, intruder- protection systems, emergency communications systems, smoke detectors, fire alarms and sprinklers.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT: LOCAL SCHOOL FUNDING TO SUPPORT HIGH QUALITY INSTRUCTION IN MATH, SCIENCE, ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY

Projects That Improve Student Success

Goals and Purposes:

This measure provides the classroom and technology improvements needed to prepare students for success in transitional kindergarten (TK) through high school, college, and careers in science, math, engineering, technology, and skilled trades.

All money raised by this measure will stay local to support Downey students and cannot be taken by the State or used for other purposes.

- Upgrade classrooms and computer infrastructure to keep pace with technology.
- Create modern, multi-use classrooms to support hands-on science technology, engineering and math instruction and learning-by-doing.
- Provide the classrooms and facilities needed to support high quality instruction in music, visual and performing arts.
- Provide modern labs, and career technical education facilities so students are prepared for college and in-demand careers in fields like health sciences, engineering, technology and skilled trades.

In addition to the projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: add or renovate student and staff restrooms; repair and upgrade electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies and financial savings; repair and replace wornout and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, floors, doors and drinking fountains/hydration stations; construct or renovate administrative support spaces and facilities for multipurpose and indoor/outdoor learning spaces, more efficient areas for professional development and administration and for the safety of students on campuses; install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices; upgrade or construct support facilities including administrative, physical education, music, art, and performing and fine arts classrooms or facilities, science/STEM labs, career technical facilities, covered eating areas, shade and rain shelter, administrative and maintenance facilities and yards; acquire modular/portable classrooms; repair and replace fire alarms, smoke detectors, sprinklers, emergency communications, public address and security systems; improve facilities to satisfy ADA and seismic requirements; as needed, removal of

hazardous materials like asbestos and lead paint from older school; resurface or replace asphalt, broken concrete and improve hard courts, turf, tracks, irrigation, and downspout drainage systems and campus landscaping; install signage, solar panels systems and fencing; expand parking and drop-off areas; improve all site utilities; acquire land; construct new classrooms and school buildings; upgrade or replace interior and exterior painting, floor covering, including carpets, and school facades; demolition; upgrade kitchens, food service and school cafeterias; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; improve outdoor learning environments and quads; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems and back-up power generators; improve playgrounds, play structures, athletic fields, lockers and facilities to support student health, fitness and safety; replace outdated security fences and security systems (including access control systems), establish single points of entry for each campus, provide lunch shelters, indoor space for assemblies or for rainy day lunch; upgrade music labs, multi-purpose rooms, learning centers and media centers; add or upgrade parking lots. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the Project List also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the Project List; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, DSA oversight, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects.

The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, network rewiring, cabling, computers, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, laser printers, scanners and copiers, digital white boards, document projectors, upgrade voice-over-IP, clock/telephone/ intercom systems, call manager and network security/firewall, wireless technology systems, refresh classroom technology, miscellaneous IT and instructional equipment, data storage, archiving and preservation, phones, identity cards and the construction and installation of a data center in the cloud for the District's enterprise systems, such as resource planning, websites, domain name systems, cloud applications and information security.

The budget for each project is an estimate and may be affected by factors beyond the District's control, such as supply chain and cost escalation challenges. The final cost of each project will be determined as plans and construction documents are finalized, construction bids are received, construction contracts are awarded and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Demolition of portable classrooms and existing facilities and reconstruction of facilities scheduled for repair and upgrade may occur, if the Board determines that such an approach would be more cost-effective in creating more enhanced and operationally efficient campuses. Necessary site preparation/restoration may occur in connection with new construction, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of relocatable or modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing, or installing irrigation or drainage systems, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads, and acquiring any necessary easements, licenses, or rights of way to the property. The listed projects will be completed as needed. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, connection fees, program and project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Proceeds of the bonds may be used to pay or reimburse the District for the cost of District bond audits and staff when performing work on or necessary and incidental to bond projects. Bond proceeds shall only be expended for the types of projects and purposes identified herein. The District shall create an account into which proceeds of the bonds shall be deposited and comply with the reporting requirements of Government Code § 53410.

FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY: THIS MEASURE REQUIRES A CLEAR SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTABILITY, INCLUDING A PROJECT LIST DETAILING HOW THE MONEY WILL BE USED, A CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE, AND INDEPENDENT AUDITS TO ENSURE MONEY IS SPENT PROPERLY.

In accordance with Education Code Section 15272, the Board of Education will appoint a citizens' oversight committee and conduct annual independent audits to assure that funds are spent only on District projects and for no other purpose. The expenditure of bond money on these projects is subject to stringent financial accountability requirements. By law, performance and financial audits will be performed annually, and all bond expenditures will be monitored by an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure that funds are spent as promised and specified. the citizens' oversight committee must include, among others, representation of a bona fide taxpayers association, a business organization and a senior citizens organization. No District employees or vendors are allowed to serve on the citizens' oversight committee.

No Administrator Salaries: Proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and school administrator salaries and other operating expenses.
